Teen Lifeline Calling and History

Our calling began with a burden for hurting teens that came to our youth ministry with the Richland Hills Church of Christ.

2009	Chris Hatchett joins staff as Executive Director. Work begins in the Birdville School
	district's D isciplinary A lternative E ducation P rogram (DAEP).
2010	Teen Lifeline curriculum completed and implemented into Fort Worth Christian High School.
2011	Work begins with Metroport Teen Court, NRH Juvenile Court and Tarrant Youth
	Recovery Campus, a teen drug rehab in Fort Worth.
2012	Over 500 students reached in 7 schools, teen courts, and at The Campus. Ricky Lewis
	becomes the first full-time Executive Director.
2013	Chris Robey is added as our second full-time employee. His work as our Program
	Director adds campuses in Southlake and Keller to the list of schools served.

Teen Lifeline Ministry Model

- We serve school age adolescents that are in crisis, or beginning to make choices that will lead to crisis.
- We identify these teens through referrals from courts, school counselors, & youth ministers.
- We influence these teens through a monthly teen parent program and weekly teen support groups.

Teen Lifeline Ministry Funding Plan

- Our current budget is \$206,600 annually.
- 100% of the Board are personally giving and along with our staff will actively raise funds from individual donors through personal meetings and fundraisers.
- For fiscal year 2011-2012, over \$192,703 was raised: Board of Directors (10%), Major Donors (28%), Individual Gifts (42%), Grant Total (8%) and Events (13%).

Teen Lifeline Ministry Results to Date

- Over 500 teenagers led through the Teen Lifeline curriculum in 2012, 200 more than 2011.
- Every one of the teen parents, and over half of the students in support groups were impacted with a strong message on the healing power of a relationship with Jesus.
- In 2013 5 new schools have requested our services for a total of 10 so far this year.
- Fall 2013 we hosted our first two training sessions; training 37 people were trained on our curriculum.

Teen Lifeline Current Needs

- \$10K for promotion and marketing to other schools and cities
- \$15K for operational expenses related to expected growth
- \$20K for development of curriculum and "next steps" program
